

Apprehensions & Charges for Other Jihadist Groups

CHOLO ABDI ABDULLAH



Cholo Abdi Abdullah, a 30-year-old citizen of Kenya, was charged in the Southern District of New York on multiple related counts of material support to Al-Shabaab, conspiracy to murder U.S. Nationals, and conspiracy to commit aircraft piracy and to destroy an aircraft. In 2016, Abdullah sought to obtain pilot training and knowledge of airport and aircraft security allegedly in order to conduct a terrorist attack on behalf of Al-Shabaab. Between 2017 and 2019, he enrolled in flight school in the Philippines and obtained his pilot's license. While in training, Abdullah allegedly conducted extensive research into the means and methods to hijack a commercial airliner, information about the tallest buildings in major U.S. cities, and the process to obtain a U.S. visa. He was arrested in July 2019 by authorities in the Philippines and recently remanded into U.S. custody.

Abdulrahman El Bahnasawy, a 22-year-old inmate in the custody of the U.S. Bureau of Prisons, reportedly stabbed a corrections officer in the eye. El Bahnasawy was arrested in May 2016 after he traveled from Canada to New York, where he planned to construct explosive devices to use in an attack in New York City on behalf of IS. El Bahnasawy, who was recently transferred to Allenwood Federal Penitentiary, Pennsylvania on November 2nd, was sentenced in 2018 in the Southern District of New York to 40 years in prison.
