

Apprehensions & Charges for Other Jihadist Groups

MURAT KURASHEV







The Department of Justice announced the arrest of Murat Kurashev, a 34-year-old resident of Sacramento, California. Kurashev, a Russian national, was charged in the Eastern District of California for attempting to provide material support to Hayat Tahrir al-Sham (HTS). The indictment alleges that the conduct occurred from approximately July 2020 through February 2021. On February 26th, a U.S. Magistrate Judge ordered Kurashev to be detained pending trial.

MOHAMED FATHY SULIMAN







February 1: Mohamed Fathy Suliman, a 33-year-old resident of Gainesville, Florida, was expelled by a foreign country and returned to the United States to face federal charges of attempting to provide material support to IS. According to the affidavit, in June 2014, Suliman booked a one-way flight from Florida to Egypt with a layover in Istanbul. Once in Istanbul, he allegedly traveled to Gaziantep, Turkey, on the border with Syria in an attempt to cross over and join IS. Suliman was arrested on June 14, 2014, by Turkish authorities while attempting to cross into Syria.
